# One by One

A man stood before an emperor. I can't imagine the thoughts or fear that he must have been struggling with. Behind him were people who had been drawn close to him simply by the fact that they all were in the same danger: if they held to their faith, they could be declared outlaws, stripped of all they had and imprisoned. One by one, everyone in the group gave confession to their faith.

Every year at Reformation (Oct. 31), we give thanks to God for the steadfast faith he gave to Martin Luther as he held firmly to God's Word. Only this time, it wasn't Luther.

The scene described above is "the presentation of the Augsburg Confession." Just over a decade after Luther nailed his 95 theses to the door of the Castle Church, Emperor Charles V demanded that Lutheran princes and city leaders stand before him to answer questions about their faith—the same faith that led to Luther and others being condemned. They presented a document called the Augsburg Confession—a beautiful confession of the truths of the Bible that led them to separate from the Catholic Church.

That scene always brings one question to mind: *To whom has God given the task of holding to pure doctrine?* 

Perhaps the impression is given, at times, that this is the task of churches and "professional theologians" - pastors and ministers. "You want to know what I believe? Ask my pastor; he knows!"

The presentation of the Augsburg Confession is remarkable in that it was presented by laypeople, not ministers. These men realized that the task of holding to God's Word doesn't belong simply to the pastor in the pulpit, but to the single person who reads her Lord's words at night, the father and mother who pull their children up on their lap for family devotions, the grandparents who pray for and encourage the next generation.

It's such a blessing to see that living among us—when members are active in worship and Bible study, when children are brought to Sunday School, when parents look for devotional tools. Thank God for that faithfulness!

And may he help us grow in it, too. Standing firm in God's Word isn't a matter of advanced degrees in theology; it comes from the simple conviction that what God says in the Bible, he means.

We celebrate the Reformation on Nov. 4th this year. Use this time to con-



sider: How might I continue to grow in the Word? Is it renewed commitment to home devotions? Becoming more faithful in worship or Bible study? Whatever it is for you, may the Lord bless you through that—and bless many others through you.

# + the Holy Christian Church +

In the Third Article of the Apostles' Creed, we confess our faith in "the Holy Christian Church." Throughout our newsletters in 2012, we'll examine what this means. What is the Church? What is the difference between "the Church" and "churches"? What does it matter what church you belong to? What's going on among "Lutheran" churches? God's Word will guide our discussion as we talk about these questions.

We have much to be grateful for in the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod. How could we not? Our synod correctly and earnestly confesses the truths of Scripture without compromise. This blessing, though, don't mean that the WELS is without its challenges. While the world around us certainly presents opposition to the truth, this article will focus on just a few of the challenges we face for us to be aware of and keep in our prayers.

# **Worship Wars**

The last decades have witnessed great changes throughout American churches. Especially within the Evangelical / non-denominational communities, the trend has been towards "contemporary", performance-driven services following a non-liturgical format derived from revivalist churches. Within the

more traditionally liturgical churches, there have been efforts to reclaim more of the traditional forms of worship from years past—liturgical rites and rituals that were lost in the transition to America.

Both of these have influenced our Synod. At times, this has been a polarizing issue. Both pastors and members have been heard making such extreme statements as "Churches that follow a traditional service will never grow!" or "Using any instrument besides an organ invites the devil into church!"

May the Lord spare us from such unbiblical statements! The liturgy is a great gift to us from the Christians who have gone before us, but the Lord does not dictate which style of worship to use. What he does command is that our worship centers on Christ, faithfully proclaiming his Word and ministering his sacraments. While Christians united in faith may differ on styles, God grant that this doesn't divide us.

### **Ministerial Training**

Our ministerial education system offers great blessings. On a recent year, the Catholic seminary near Chicago that provided priests for thousands of parishes graduated six men—all over 40. That same year, our Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary graduated over forty pastors. The other Lutheran synods in America have also faced great troubles in bring younger people to study for the ministry. Our young men also all receive years of

grounding in the biblical languages that was not provided in the Catholic seminary, and has been becoming either optional or not even offered in other Lutheran seminaries.

There are real challenges facing our education system, though. With education and insurance costs rising, our system isn't cheap. Rising synodical costs have led to cuts in funding to student aid. Our Martin Luther College now costs considerably more to attend than most public colleges (with synod teachers generally making 20-30% less than their public counterparts). Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary—which once offered free tuition to all future pastors—is nearly as expensive. This not only presents students with a financial challenge; it also tempts many to jeopardize their education by working too many hours to pay for it.

With the majority of our synod grade schools and high schools in the Midwest, a great majority of our future ministers come from that area of the country as well. There would be great blessing in having a ministerium that draws from all areas of our country. That challenge dovetails with another issue: our current enrollment trend is likely to leave us with a shortage of pastors for the foreseeable future. May the Lord grant us many students eager to share the gospel from all parts of the country and all demographics!



Most of the greatest challenges come simply from the ways we fail to take God's Word to heart. Pastors who act like tyrants or are unfaithful with the Word. Teachers who don't treasure their tasks and teach to the best of their abilities. Members who fail to support the gospel or let personal issues divide and plague the church.

What do we do with challenges like this? Take them seriously! The truth of God's Word and the hope of heaven demands that we do no less than that! And as we take them seriously, we remember Jesus' words, too: "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). May the Lord continue to bless our church body that we might face our challenges honestly and hold to his Word fearlessly!


