Freedom!

How are you going to celebrate your freedom?

For the next few days, you'll no doubt be hearing the sound of firecrackers through your window at night, and smelling grills and barbeques in the evening breeze. As we celebrate July 4th, people will be grilling out, boating, and gathering together with family and friends.

It's good that we set aside time to thank God for the gift of freedom that he's given us in our nation. And, of course, there are much higher ways to celebrate that freedom. We have freedom of religion, so we use it as we share the gospel boldly. We have great economic freedom, so we act as children of God as we care for those around us. We have freedom of speech that allows us to be active voices in our government, so we speak up, work hard and vote thoughtfully to be the best influences on our country as we can. After all, freedom is to be used. Doesn't it sadden you when that freedom is wasted?

That's all the more true in the Kingdom of God. Listen to the way God says it through St. Peter: Live as free men, but do not use your freedom as a cover-up for evil; live as servants

of God. (1 Peter 2:16)

As a Christian, you're *free*. You know that God has paid the price for *all* your sins. Every one of them. That means that not only has he washed away the guilt of your past, but also the guilt of the sins that you've not yet done. Your salvation does not depend on how good or loving *you* are, but how loving and gracious *God is*. That's freedom!

Doesn't it sadden you to think of the way that we so often waste that freedom? Peter talks about Christians using their freedom as a "cover-up" for evil. You could sum it everything he says in the entire section this way: God's saved you from the sins of this world, so live that way! If our freedom is found in being forgiven, what a waste when we run back to the same sins.

God reminds us that living in our freedom automatically leads to people seeing our good deeds and glorifying God on the day that he returns. Perhaps a good measure of whether you're using your freedom is this: Do the people who regular see you know that you're a Christian? Do they see someone who puts their faith into action? Someone who could rightly be called a "servant of God?"



Every July 4th comes with a humbling reminder for me: I didn't do a thing to earn our country's freedom. Someone else won it. I just get to enjoy it and live in it.

So it is with our freedom in Christ. It's a gift! May God bless you as you live in it, and as you put your faith into practice, may God bless our nation through you!

In the Third Article of the Apostles' Creed, we confess our faith in "the Holy Christian Church." Throughout our newsletters in 2012, we'll examine what this means. What is the Church? What is the difference between "the Church" and "churches"? What does it matter what church you belong to? What's going on among "Lutheran" churches? God's Word will guide our discussion as we talk about these questions.

Do denominations really matter?

It wouldn't seem so—at least not by the trends in our country over the last few decades. (*Denominations* are the various nation-wide church bodies that congregations form.)


According to one recent survey, more than two-thirds of church -going Americans would have little-to-no problem switching church bodies. The last few decades have seen the rise of "non -denominational churches" - congregations that have no allegiance to a larger church body (such as Southern Baptist, Presbyterian Church of America, or Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod). Other studies have suggested that this trend is growing among younger generations.

Grouping churches together in denominations serves many helpful purposes—and one *vital* purpose. It's *helpful* to work together as a church body to operate ministerial education schools to train our pastors and teachers. It's *helpful* to work together to send missionaries overseas and to publish materials to help share God's Word with others. All of those things are helpful; while individual congregations could do some of that work on our own, it's often more efficient and practical to do it together.

Those are benefits of grouping together in denominations, but they aren't the real purpose. God calls us to make a faithful confession of his Word to this world. He says through St. Paul, "For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you confess and are saved" (Romans 10:10). He says this confession needs to be clear and accurate. Consider his guidance for a young pastor: "Watch your life and doctrine closely. Persevere in them, because if you do, you will save both yourself and your hearers" (1 Timothy 4:16).

Our "denominational labels" are one of the ways we confess what we believe. While virtually every Christian church claims to hold to the Bible, many—in fact, the great majority of them—boldly teach things that are against God's clear Word. Most often, their written confessions of doctrine make this clear. For example:

- The Roman Catholic Church's doctrinal statements proclaim that anyone who believes in salvation by grace, apart from works, is eternally damned.
- Baptist denominations state that baptism does *not* give faith and salvation, though God's Word says it does.
- The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America openly condones the kind of sinful lifestyles that Jesus says destroy our faith and take us away from God.



The most important thing that we have is our faith in God. God calls us to confess those

truths faithfully! Certainly there are many who don't think denominations matter—indeed, many denominations give that impression. But God calls us to give a clear confession of his Word. God grant that we take that to heart as we learn the truths of his Word more deeply and rejoice in the confession we share as Christians united in the WELS. May God give strength and courage to those who are in denominations that don't teach the truth to seek out churches that do. And in all these things, may he lead us to see that what matters *most* isn't the denomination we're in, but the truths of his Word that we confess. Because when our denomination is always centered on God's Word, then it's a confession that truly matters.

Building project update

Possible locations:

The congregation gave great support to making an offer on the corner of Baxter and Davis. That work is still going forward. The development group that owns it has suggested a 3-5 acre parcel with frontage on Davis. They've asked for a meeting on July 11th to discuss options and costs. In the meantime, developers are bringing us proposals for a location in the Norton Ranch area (north of Huffine, west of Jackrabbit), and we've recently received information on a possibility on the corner of Ferguson and Babcock.

Valley Center land

The sale of the six acre parcel of Valley Center is now complete and we've received payment. The house and remaining acre will be leased to the new buyer starting in early July, with a tentative sale date before the close of 2012.

Grants and other financial news:

God blessed Shining Mountains with an incredible Christmas gift—a \$45,000 grant towards the design of a new church from the Antioch Foundation. (For more information on the Antioch Foundation, see bulletin announcements or visit www.theantiochfoundation.org.)

2011 also saw a clarification of our status with the WELS Church Extension Fund (CEF). Because of the size and nature of our worship space, Shining Mountains should now be eligible for both a low interest rate (4%) on a new loan as well as a significant grant towards construction costs of a new church home.


September 28-30, 2012 Fairmont Hot Springs Resort
